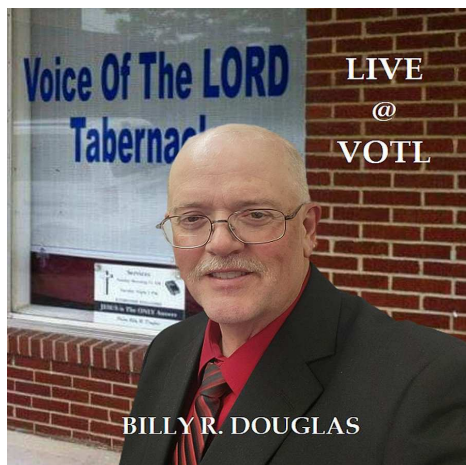

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Love: The Cherished Garment of Charity

The Apostle Paul, in the third chapter of his letter to the Colossians, exhorts us to put on, or wear, several pieces of clothing; the most important piece being that of charity – perfect love. “Put on therefore, as the elect of God, holy and beloved, bowels of mercies, kindness, humbleness of mind, meekness, longsuffering; Forbearing one another, and forgiving one another, if any man have a quarrel against any: even as Christ forgave you, so also do ye. And above all these things put on charity, which is the bond of perfectness. And let the peace of God rule in your hearts, to the which also ye are called in one body; and be ye thankful.” (v. 12-15)

Having been a short-term missionary in India, I had the blessing to witness the modest and beautiful dress of the women there. Arriving at the church I would be working with, there was a large gathering of women dressed in traditional garb who performed a traditional Indian dance complete with finger cymbals and song. It was a sight to behold.

One devotional writer, from long ago, accurately described both the clothing they wore and the corresponding spiritual application. “In the dress of a Hindu woman, her graceful robe is fastened upon her person entirely by means of a single knot. The long strip of cloth is wound around her person so as to fall in graceful folds like a made garment, and the end is fastened by a little knot, and the whole thing hangs by that single fastening. If that were loosed the robe would fall. And so in the spiritual life our habits of grace are likened unto garments; and it is also true that the garment of love, which is the beautiful adorning of the child of God, is entirely fastened by little knots.” (A.B. Simpson)

The outer garment of God’s love - in us and reaching out to others through us - holds all these other garments Paul mentions securely in place. Such perfect love leads to God’s peace ruling in our hearts and, according to Peter, “shall cover the multitude of sins.” (1 Pet. 4:8) To “cover” is to hide, to put out of sight. Instead of the self-love that takes pleasure in exposing every fault of a brother—to make oneself look better or to foster pity from others—the love which stems from our Redeemer seeks to protect the offending brother, concealing such offences from the notice of others. For the sake of Christ and His Church, one who possesses such fervent love doesn’t hold a grudge, but rather, forgives “until seventy times seven.” And for the sake of that offending brother, motivated by this same love, he will go to his brother in secret to exhort, rebuke, or reprove. This is love in action. Though love and forgiveness are not always passed on by those who receive such grace from others, it must be passed on by the believer. It’s good for our own soul and it’s a seed that is replanted in others.

With so much at stake, let us keep this garment of love firmly fastened, caring for the “little knots” that keep love securely held in its rightful position. What are these “knots” that hold such love in place? Paul shares these with us in the thirteenth chapter of his first letter to the church at Corinth: Such love (charity) “...envieth not, charity vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up, doth not behave itself unseemly, seeketh not her own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil, rejoiceth not in iniquity.” Although there are many things that define love in positive terms, there are enough ‘knots’ here to keep love in place, holding our spiritual wardrobe together as God would have it.

A.B. Simpson, in speaking of these “knots,” reminded us that “Here are reasons enough to explain the failure of so many, and the reason why they walk naked, or with rent garments, and others see their shame.” Finally exhorting us to “look after the knots.”

In all that we do it must be the love of Christ that constrains us. As Oswald Chambers so aptly put it, “Love is the beginning and the middle and the end – the first sign, stamp, and seal – of the saint. Stronger than death, deeper than hell, higher than heaven, is the mighty personal devotion to the Lord Jesus Christ. No one can ever destroy the individual whose heart is in personal, passionate devotion to Jesus.”

So then, by His grace, let us love and walk as Jesus loved and walked, giving our lives for others because He first gave His life for us. May we keep the garment of love firmly bound in place that our brothers, our world, and our God might see our love for Him.

Strawberry Punch

3 sm. pkg. strawberry jello

1 pkg. strawberry kool-aid

3 c. sugar

4 c. hot water

12 oz. frozen orange juice

6 oz. frozen lemonade

1 gallon cold water

2 qt. ginger ale

1/2 gallon strawberry ice cream

Mix first 4 ingredients until well dissolved. Add juices and cold water. At time of serving add the ginger ale and ice cream.

Zesty Italian Crescent Casserole

1 lb. lean ground beef

1/4 cup chopped onion

1 cup spaghetti sauce

6 oz. (1 1/2 cups) shredded mozzarella

1/2 cup sour cream

1 can (8 oz) Crescent Rolls

1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese

2 Tbsp butter or margarine, melted

Optional - may add green peppers & mushrooms

Heat oven to 375°F. In large skillet, cook ground beef and onion over medium heat, drain.. Stir in sauce; heat thoroughly. In medium bowl, combine mozzarella cheese and sour cream; mix well. Pour hot beef mixture into ungreased 12x8-inch (2-quart) glass baking dish. Spoon cheese mixture over beef mixture. Unroll dough over cheese mixture. In small bowl, mix Parmesan cheese and butter. Spread evenly over dough.

Bake at 375°F. for 18 to 25 minutes or until deep golden brown.

Chocolate Chip Cookies

2/3 cup butter

1/2 cup sugar

1/2 cup brown sugar

1 tsp vanilla

1 egg

1 1/2 cups all purpose flour

1/2 tsp baking soda

1/2 tsp salt

1 pkg semi sweet chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 375. Mix first 4 ingredients thoroughly. Stir in remaining ingredients. Drop dough by rounded tsp. 2" apart on an ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 8-10 minutes or until light brown.

Sausage Breakfast Casserole

1 (16 ounce) package Regular Jimmy Dean Pork Sausage

10 large eggs, lightly beaten

3 cups milk

2 teaspoons dry mustard

1 teaspoon salt

6 cups cubed bread

2 cups shredded sharp Cheddar cheese

1 medium tomato, seeded and chopped

1/2 cup sliced mushrooms

1/2 cup thin-sliced green onion

1/2 teaspoon black pepper

Preheat the oven to 325 degrees F (165 degrees C). Grease a 9x13-inch baking dish with cooking spray.

Cook sausage in a large skillet over medium-high heat, stirring frequently, until thoroughly cooked and no longer pink, 8 to 10 minutes. Remove from heat. Combine eggs, milk, dry mustard, and salt in a large bowl; stir well. Distribute 1/2 of the bread evenly into the prepared dish. Sprinkle with 1/2 of the sausage, 1/2 of the cheese, 1/2 of the tomato, 1/2 of the mushroom, 1/2 of the green onion, and 1/2 of the black pepper. Repeat layers one more time. Pour egg mixture evenly over casserole. Bake uncovered until eggs are set, 55 to 60 minutes. Tent with foil if the top begins to brown too quickly

For years the church resisted the devil of compromise; we refused to open our doors to idolatry, ungodliness, and worldliness. We were ostracized, mocked, and persecuted, but we refused to give an inch to that which we recognized was not of God. Like the prodigal son, we were hated because we were different. The prodigal, after he had wasted all in riotous living, beat on the door of the world, asking for help. The world answered, "Feed my hogs." His convictions of religion were the price the world asked for its help. The world hated him because he was different.

That same world beat on our church doors, screaming to be let in on their own grounds. "Let down the wall a little and you will attract more people," was their cry. In the beginning of this great latter rain outpouring, God called men from every walk of life. It was a time when the church was dead. Empty forms and hollow mockery had replaced the mighty moving of God. God called our fathers from the market place, from the farm, from the pulpits of major churches and denominations. They separated themselves unto God. They knew God was different from the world. They knew also that world was their enemy. They were labeled fanatics and worse.

They not only preached holiness of heart, they preached holiness of conduct. They knew God, and they knew the enemy. They knew where they came from, and they knew where they were going. They refused to give an inch to that compromising spirit. As men of God, they stood for truth, purity, and holiness; not only with the words they spoke, but also with the lives they lived. Christ was their life and nothing else mattered. For years the enemy stormed the walls and was driven back again and again. The world knew we were different; we never visited their theaters, smoked their tobacco, or drank their liquor. We walked their streets as men and women of God. Faithfulness to God demanded that we remain foreigners on this planet. We were hated because Christ was among us and in us.

The Antichrist spirit that came against us did not come in the form of an enemy or a false religion--he came disguised as one of us. He had to be what we were. He came as one who, like Samson, had once known this power, and though he had lost it, still knew how it worked. The devil knew what he was doing. Satan's way is deception by imitation. Our fathers knew that. That half-naked, liquor drinking, worldly crowd was not of God, so they resisted every pressure. But when that Antichrist spirit came to our gate imitating our most precious beliefs, we were deceived. For years other religions screamed at us, "Why can't you be like us? Why don't you preach and live like we live?" There was no way idolatry could be a part of us. All of that changed with the appearance of this crowd standing at our door dressed in a mini-skirt.

There came into our midst an imitation spirit and we opened the door and let it in. Not knowing that demons were leading them. Those demons opened the door for every unclean and hateful thing imaginable. Roman Catholics were repeating the rosary in what men called a "prayer language," and much of the church thought it was real. Mormons said, "I've not been born again, but I talk in tongues". A lady in Houston, at a Full Gospel convention gave this testimony, "Tonight, before I came I had two cocktails, but as I started to have the third one, the Holy Spirit said, 'Two is enough.'" Everything of the world, flesh, and the devil came in with that crowd. What we once believed, we don't believe anymore. What we once stood for, we don't stand for anymore.

It is considered negative and a lack of love to be against anything anymore. We are afraid to declare truth. By our silence we say to the people, "You can have all of this 'dung' and the Holy Ghost too". We have let them inside; the hedge has been broken and a snake has bitten us. The cost of this deception cannot be calculated. The same sins that are in the world are now in the church. The nation sinks in a moral crisis. Healing has been reduced to a confession. Salvation has been reduced to the repeating of a prayer, and the baptism of the Holy Ghost to a taught tongue. We didn't change that worldly crowd, they changed us, and we called it revival.



God's Got This



It's easy to get discouraged when we look around and see the world acting as the world and unbelievers acting as unbelievers; we find it downright distasteful and rightfully so. It also leaves a bitter taste in our "mouths" when we see those who claim the name of Christ living like the world instead of the Body of Christ or when their actions seem apathetic toward the Kingdom of God. We shake our heads when the Body doesn't follow the Head's direction, realizing that if this were happening physically, people would rush, with urgency, to see a doctor. After all, when there is a disconnect between the head's commands and the body's actions, there is obviously something wrong. That puts us in a vulnerable and dangerous position. Spiritually, the same is true and we don't like it.

In either case, we often shake our heads in amazement, asking, "What is God doing?" or "Why does God allow this?"

Even in the hardest of times and the most dangerous of situations, let us always remember that God is sovereign, His timing is perfect, and our duty is to walk in faithful obedience, fully trusting in Him. Simply put, God's got this. Perhaps this little story will better explain my point.
