A Word to the Wise – Choose Wisdom (Prov. 1:20-33)

"Wisdom crieth without; she uttereth her voice in the streets:" Proverbs 1:20

None can claim ignorance of Wisdom's clear and loud cry; her words rings true in the ear of every man, even if men will reject it in their hearts to both their detriment and their destruction. Solomon began this chapter pointing to the holy path of wisdom which begins with the fear of the Lord. Then he solemnly warns against bad company; it may have a short-lived season of gain, but such riches and popularity are nothing compared to the eternal loss which is the end of every one who rejects the voice of Wisdom. In his warning (v. 10-19), he spells out that any greatness unhitched from holiness eventually devolves into wickedness.

Wisdom doesn't whisper in the ears of a few favorites but stands in the streets and gates, desiring to be heard by all. Man may find Wisdom's truths in a Bible-loving pulpit, but he has no excuse if the preacher isn't faithful to his divine call. For Wisdom shouts from creation, the beasts of the field and birds of the air, and whispers in the heart/conscience of each person if they will only listen rather than willfully shutting their ears. National and familial histories also bear out the truth of Wisdom's call.

Hearken to Wisdom's call; don't be found in the ranks of the "sinners," "scoffers," or "fools" who chase after vanity, scoff at holiness, and reject truth, opting for their own way. Wisdom's call is mercifully spoken, "Ho, every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, and he that hath no money; come ye, buy, and eat; yea, come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. Wherefore do ye spend money for that which is not bread? and your labour for that which satisfieth not? hearken diligently unto me, and eat ye that which is good, and let your soul delight itself in fatness. Incline your ear, and come unto me: hear, and your soul shall live; and I will make an everlasting covenant with you, even the sure mercies of David." (Is. 55:1-3) Yet, it comes at a price, to turn away, to repent of one's sinfilled ways. "Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts: and let him return unto the LORD, and he will have mercy upon him; and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon." (Is. 55:7)

Dear Reader, be quick to turn your feet into Wisdom's path as she pleads with you. Do not hesitate to turn from your wickedness and self-promoting ways. The disastrous end of those who refuse to answer Wisdom's call will be very terrible, but very just. Be sure to read with horror Prov. 1:24-28. Although the prayer of genuine faith is always heard, as George Lawson put it, "the prayers of these desperate rebels...are cries extorted by strong necessity, and intolerable anguish." In other words, such are not calling out in faith to love of God, but rather, are attempting to use God for their own self-ish purposes once more. When men choose the short-lived pleasures of sin over the righteous fear of the Lord, how can they possibly hope to escape hell? They've chosen foolishly instead of wisely. They've chosen the temporary and temporal over the eternal. So often such choices eventually bring temporal destruction as well.

Verse 33 brings a two-fold promise of safety and quiet from the fear of evil if we will hear and obey Wisdom's call. In Matthew 7:24, Jesus likened such a one to a wise man who built his house upon the rock. We can either fear the Lord or fear evil. I plead with you to choose wisely.

We would do well to take heed to George Lawson's exhortation: "Let us examine ourselves impartially, whether we are the despisers or the lovers of wisdom... Do we value Christ over the whole world? Do we prefer holiness, in its most painful exercises, to the most pleasant sins?" Pray "that the Lord by his Spirit would open our hearts, that we may attend to the dictates of heavenly wisdom."

To Do OR Not To Do – That's the Question

"But Daniel purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself with the portion of the king's meat, nor with the wine which he drank:" Daniel 1:8

When I look at the life of Daniel I am amazed at his determined purpose to stand true and faithful. He had been raised knowing the Holy One of Israel, the One True God. He had real faith and He loved his God. Regardless of whether he was at home with his parents or away from their godly influence; no matter if he was in the palace of the king or in a den of lions; Daniel was at home with God and desired to please Him come what may.

I wonder if you realize the two different ways in which Daniel was tested. Reading the account of his life, one can see that he was commanded to do that which God told him not to do (eat the king's meat and drink the king's wine). And later, he was commanded NOT to do that which God told him to do (do not pray or petition anyone but the king). Why did Daniel have "a purpose true, heeding God's command?" It was because Daniel loved the Lord his God with all his heart, with all his soul, with all his strength, with all his mind; and his neighbor as himself.

How about you? You may never be asked to eat the king's meat or drink his wine; but there are many things today that our culture insists that one does which God commands us not to do. Some examples of this, although not an exhaustive list, would include: God says that He hates divorce and what God has joined together (in marriage) man should not tear apart; the world says it's okay to divorce for the kids' sake or for just about any other reason nowa-days, even in the church. God says do not kill; the world offers abortion and euthanasia as solutions to an unwanted pregnancy or one's painful mental or physical health. God says, "Do not lie, cheat, steal, defraud, or bear false witness;" the world says you can make up your own truth, boys can be girls and girls can be boys. World records and scholarships for women are being given to men claiming to be women, and even many so-called Christian institutions of higher learning are insisting that their professors and students buy the lie, calling others by cross-gender pronouns. God says, "Do not to take My name in vain;" the world started using slang words, which are euphemisms for the name of God, on TV and in public, making it "acceptable." This continues to be "acceptable" in Christian entertainment and with many ministry speakers as well. As men and women claim the name of Christ but do not live transformed lives, God's name is also being taken in vain. God says, "Don't work on the Sabbath;" the world has promoted a 7-day work week and many Christians see no problem with buying or selling on that day which is meant to be set apart as holy.

In like manner, there are things which our culture demands we do NOT do which God bids us to do. Again, not an exhaustive list but here is a short list to get your mind rolling: God says to come to the Father through Jesus Christ; the world says we can't pray in the name of Jesus at public school graduations, public school sporting events, or even in our government legislatures. The world tells us not to speak of the exclusivity of Jesus. We are compelled to view all religions in the same manner. Oddly, Christianity is constantly being downplayed while other religions are being elevated and given preference in our country. God says, "Honor your father and mother;" the world has pushed the divorce-your-parents movement. God says, "Love your enemies;" the world says, "Do unto them before they do unto you, look out for number one, show no mercy, don't forgive – get even, outdo others in hate," and the list of ways to not love your enemies continues ad infinitum. As Christians, we are called to live before God and men with a clear conscience, yet our government and work places are pushing us to go against our consciences in varied ways, erasing the religious liberties our forefathers fought for and codified to protect. God calls us to live by His various definitions – love, justice, equity, marriage, to name but a few. Men have hijacked such words for their own purposes and demand that we live by their new definitions. Church, beware!

I urge you, "Dare to be a Daniel! Dare to stand alone. Dare to have a purpose firm; dare to make it known!"

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7 Day Sweet Pickles

12 medium to large cucumbers

8 cups sugar

2 T mixed pickling spice

4 tsp un-iodized med course salt

4 cups brown vinegar

Cover cucumbers with fresh boiling water for 4 days (I use a stone jar). Change water everyday. Fifth day, drain and slice into 1/2 inch slices. Combine all ingredients, bring to a rolling boil and pour back over pickles and cover. Let stand 24 hours, drain syrup off of pickles, bring to a rolling boil and pour back over pickles. On the third day pack in clean quart or pint jars. Reheat the syrup and strain it as you pour over pickles and seal them. Refrigerate before serving.

Baked Crab Dip

1 (8oz) pkg cream cheese, softened

1 (6oz) can crab meat

2 T grated onion

1 T milk

1/2 tsp salt

1/4 tsp pepper

1/4 tsp Worcestershire sauce

1 T finely sliced green onion for garnish

In a medium bowl combine all ingredients, except green onions. Stir well. Place mixture in a ovenproof serving dish and sprinkle with a little paprika. Bake at 375 for about 15 minutes or until thoroughly heated. Sprinkle with sliced green onions and serve.

Baked Beans

1 large can pork & beans

1 cup brown sugar

1 cup catsup

2 Tablespoons mustard

1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

1 teaspoon Louisiana hot sauce

1/2 onion, chopped

1/2 bell pepper, chopped

1 cup sliced smoked sausage

Pour pork & beans into a baking dish. Add brown sugar, catsup, mustard, Worcestershire sauce & hot sauce. In a separate pan, sauté onion, bell pepper & smoked sausage. Add to beans, stir well. Bake 350°, 20-30 minutes.

Easy Pecan Bars

1 can (8 oz) refrigerated crescent rolls

3/4 cup chopped pecans

1/2 cup sugar

1/2 cup corn syrup

2 Tbsp butter or margarine, melted

1 tsp vanilla

1 egg, beaten

Heat oven to 350°F. Unroll dough and press in bottom and 1/2 inch up sides of a 9×13-inch pan. Firmly press perforations to seal. Bake 8 minutes. Meanwhile, in medium bowl, mix remaining ingredients. Pour filling over partially baked crust. Bake 18 to 22 minutes longer or until golden brown. Cool completely, about 1 hour, and cut into bars


There's work to do, deadlines to meet; You've got no time to spare, Before you hurry and scurry, ASAP – Always Say A Prayer.

Thought for Today: A longing to be in the presence of God is the heart of the believer.

Story for Today: Leola and Dave pulled into the parking lot of their favorite place to be. As the elderly couple got out of their car, Dave offered his arm to the frail lady at his side. The couple had been attending this church for over 65 years and it felt almost as comfortable to them as their own home. The couple cautiously made their way into the beautiful stone building. Dave remembered the long nights after work spent setting those stones and the other work on the building. As they entered the sanctuary a peace filled them as they felt the joy of drawing close to the one that they loved. This couple lived the Christian life and God invaded every part of it, however, meeting with other believers to worship their Creator was a blessing the couple enjoyed every opportunity they could. Dave looked forward to reading the word each day with Leola, and she relished the times of discussion regarding what God was revealing to them of himself. With their declining health, Dave and Leola felt blessed to be able to read the Word and also to still get out and go places. They didn't go out as much as they used to and getting ready took a lot out of them. Leola had spent a few weeks in the hospital several months back and Dave was grateful to have her home under the same roof with him again. He did everything he could to help her both physically and spiritually. He knew the importance of finishing well.

Psalm 42 was the reading for today. Dave paused at the end of verse two. During those weeks when Leola was first released from the hospital, he had struggled. She had needed constant care and was unable to leave their home but he longed to enter the congregate worship. He had watched the message on the computer and was grateful. He had prayed and was grateful. He realized that the building, while precious and beautiful, was not the only place where he could be with God. It was the purposeful release of all other things and the purposeful entering into the presence of the Most Holy that his soul longed for. They were both so grateful to be able to return to the fellowship. But those days had taught him that even if physically unable to meet at a place of worship, he and Leola were able to worship the Most Holy. They could individually, as a couple, or as a congregation put aside all else to worship and honor God. Leola mentioned that believers in persecuted nations experienced worship in a different and maybe more honoring way as they sacrificed and truly entered into the presence of God even if it cost them their life on this earth. She mentioned that some had no one else with whom to worship. Dave thought about that. He realized that the day may come when he or Leola may die or be confined to a bed, unable to go out. He was so grateful that everyone had the opportunity to worship God where they were; whether in a foxhole on the battlefield, in their home, or a building built specifically for worship.

Questions for Today: Are you desperate to meet with God, to worship and glorify Him? Do you attend church with the express intent of emptying yourself of the world and its influences to be filled with God? Or do you attend church, willing to sing and pray and go through the routine of church life, but not concerned about having intimate moments with the Heavenly Father?

Prayer for Today: Heavenly Father, please forgive our apathy. Please help us to enter into true worship and not use the church as a social club. Please help us to long after an intimate relationship with You. Help us to do our part to make each moment of our day glorifying to You. In Jesus's Name, Amen.

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
