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Story Behind The Song

America

If I were to ask our readers: What is the title of America's National Anthem? Assuredly, many would quickly reply: The Star-Spangled Banner!

But how many of you know that the United States had an unofficial national anthem for nearly 100 years before our current one was adopted in 1931? It was written by Samuel Francis Smith, a 24-year-old Baptist seminary student. It took him about 30 minutes to write, was set to the tune of "God Save the King," and was first performed on July 4, 1831 by a children's choir in Boston. Though Samuel Smith titled his song "America," it soon became better known as "My Country, 'Tis of Thee."

What made this hymn so popular, so fast? I can think of at least three possible reasons: 1) It is personalized, so it's drawing and gives each singer a sense of personal ownership in this native land called America: MY COUNTRY 'tis of thee...Land where MY FATHERS died...MY NATIVE country...thy name I LOVE... I LOVE thy rocks and rills...MY HEART with rapture thrills. Then, upon reaching the fourth verse, it moves from a personal proclamation to a national and united resounding of Hope in God – making a petition of prayer to the Almighty that "OUR land be bright" with holiness and pleading for His mighty protection, while making a united declaration that this Great God who gives freedom and liberty IS OUR KING!

2) The lyrics remind us of America's victorious and sacrificial history in the first verse; declares her beauty and blessedness in the second verse; gives us a call to enduring praise in the third; and, finally, points to the One, True God of our fathers', declaring Him still our Sovereign and all-powerful King! Dear Reader, we need to embrace the truths behind all four verses of Samuel Francis Smith's hymn; we need to feel and exude these truths once more.

3) Each of the four stanzas speak of freedom, that God-given quality which sets us apart from other nations. Americans loved freedom and, at that time, loved to see and acknowledge the Divine Hand of Providence at work in our nation. This is a decidedly Christian hymn dedicated to a nation that was decidedly founded upon Christian principles and looked to the Bible for guidance.

The story behind this song is richer and fuller than I've written here and its roles in our history since its inception is rich as well. Let me close with just two examples: 1) This song was a particularly beloved song to President Abraham Lincoln; he frequently would ask for it to be played at state functions. 2) On August 28, 1963 another Baptist preacher would use this hymn as a springboard, adding particular widening and depth, in his well-renowned speech. You likely have guessed that it was Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. who used "America" as inspiration for his "I Have a Dream" speech.

With the uncertainty that is so pervasive in our United States today, we need to rally around and cling to the certainty that can be found in verse four. May this be our earnest prayer today!

Our fathers' God, to Thee, author of liberty, to Thee we sing:
Long may our land be bright with freedom's holy light;
Protect us by Thy might, great God, our King!



**Word to the Wise – Pride’s Dangers - 02**

“Hear ye, and give ear; be not proud: for the LORD hath spoken.” Jeremiah 13:15

Last month we learned three main lessons regarding pride by looking at two prominent kings in the Old Testament. By way of review, here are those lessons: 1. Pride can make you take credit or glory which belongs to another: (King Nebuchadnezzar) 2. Pride can make you assume another’s position or steal their responsibilities – makes you too big for your britches: (King Uzziah) 3. Pride can cause you to do many wrong things, the greatest of which is to forget God and that He is the Giver of every good gift, skill, ability, and position.

Though we could learn other lessons regarding pride in our own personal lives, being July, let us look at national pride and our response to it as Christians. With the high likelihood of being misunderstood and with all due respect to Lee Greenwood and his inspiring, popular American tribute, God Bless the U.S.A. – with lines like “And I’m proud to be an American...” – let us keep in mind that a great majority of us had nothing to do with our being citizens of this great land. It was by God’s providential hand that we were born in our native land; He placed us in the family we grew up in; we’ve made choices which affect our lives here, but while we may be grateful and even pleased that God has planted us where we are, there is very little that we can take credit for, for which we can claim pride.

Biblical Israel often fell into this sinful position of national pride. The prophets would often warn the people against pride in their spiritual privilege and in being God’s “chosen people.” Later, in the New Testament, Jesus would also bring this warning against pride, particularly to the pharisees. There is nothing wrong with loving one’s country, defending one’s native land, recognizing the benefits of living where one lives, and seeing how it benefits other nations as well. But it should be seen through the lens of God’s providence and His working within that country, as well as how He has blessed it or brought it low that its people might return to Him.

Following our key verse (warning us against pride), we see the preventative to pride in verse 16: “Give glory to the LORD your God...;” this is an Old Testament idiom which means “Confess your sins” (cf. Joshua 7:19). Therefore, this preventative or cure for pride is: giving God glory – recognizing His holy person and His sovereign position, praising Him, humbly confessing our sins before Him, submitting to Him, and humbling ourselves in obedience to His holy Word. If we truly humble ourselves before Him, He shall lift us up; the converse is also true. If we stand in pride or glory in ourselves (or our land), we WILL be brought low. Instead of light, we shall receive darkness; judgment becomes ours, rather than blessing. During this month which encourages patriotic pride, let us learn the lesson of humility – recognizing that all we have has come from God’s good hand and that all we are is by God’s good graces. If we are in trouble (nationally or personally), let us call for days of humiliation and prayer, as our forefathers once did in days of old. Can we objectively see where we stand in comparison to God’s righteous laws and to His holiness? Pray for clarity and a spirit of confession.

Verses 17-18 continue: “But if ye will not hear it, my soul shall weep in secret places for your pride; and mine eye shall weep sore, and run down with tears, because the LORD’S flock is carried away captive. Say unto the king and to the queen, Humble yourselves, sit down: for your principalities shall come down, even the crown of your glory.”

Will we heed the warning that Israel refused? Will we humble ourselves or continue in pride? Look at it this way: As Christians, the Kingdom of God is our native land, we are mere sojourners in America, pointing others to Jesus Christ and His atoning work upon the cross so that they, also, might become natives, through adoption by the King, into God’s glorious Kingdom.



Encourage One Another

“Wherefore comfort yourselves together, and edify one another, even as also ye do.” (1 Thess. 5:11)

Many, if not most, Americans have an appreciation for sports; one might say that it's often an enthusiasm if they have a favorite team or they have a personal relationship with someone on a team. My youngest daughter has been playing softball for several seasons now, I've attended quite a few practices and many games. I've witnessed several types of “encouragers” and have heard various chants and cheers – perhaps better called chants and jeers. I strongly discourage my daughter from taking part in those jeers – they serve no purpose but to make fun of others or to throw-off the pitcher. At the same time, I encourage her to recognize and acknowledge good hits or plays, regardless of which team that player is on. I want her to learn to be a “Barnabas,” the “Son of Encouragement,” in good times or bad, winning or losing. If we allow our circumstances to get us down, it's very difficult to encourage others while we, ourselves, are discouraged!

It's more than training her for good sportsmanship; my desire is for her to learn, for life, not to put others down and to encourage all those she interacts with. Truly, it's a matter of putting the “Golden Rule” into practice: “Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them: for this is the law and the prophets.”

You may wonder what I meant by “several types of ‘encouragers.’” I've seen teammates and spectators kindly come alongside a player who's made a mistake, giving encouragement: “You've got this; shake it off; refocus!” I've also seen negative “encouragement” – when people put the player down in hopes of making them to do better. I saw one mother grab her catcher daughter by the facemask, shake her, and yell at her. I've also witnessed others more subtly come alongside a player with kind words or loving affirmations, and advice between innings.

Encouragement – the right kind – can do wonders for another who is giving it their best but becoming weary. One never knows how our kind words or coming alongside to help will not only boost the other's morale, but, perhaps, give them the extra persistence they need to make it through to the end. I recently read about a man who attended a rope-climbing contest. “The course was made up of an arrangement of rope, rubber tires, and sticks, and it reached a breathtaking height of sixty feet. Each of its four sections got harder, with the highest section being the most difficult. If a contestant managed to reach the top, he would ring the little bell there and receive a prize.” The writer shared how these young men would attack the course with great energy and vigor, climbing quickly at first, with determination, only to give up at varying stages as the course got tougher and they tired. Then “another young man started to climb and rose higher and higher. At one point he seemed ready to give up, but then his daddy started shouting words of encouragement. ‘Don't give up; you're almost there; you can do it!’ And in triumph the young man reached the top and rang the bell.” Can you imagine how this father's words not only encouraged his son on to victory, but how this type of encouraging interaction must have encouraged their relationship as well?

Likely, all of us could “Barney up” a little better; coming alongside with words of truth and encouragement. Of course, it's vital in our individual families and in our churches, but let's also speak into the lives of strangers who the Lord puts in our path. Let's be loving, encouraging, and truth-telling. Such a witness may bring others to Christ, snatching them from the gates of Hell. It may also keep others from falling and, in so doing, we also encourage ourselves to stand stronger and steadfast. We are not “Sons of Encouragement” in our own strength; it is the gift and grace of God for the use of winning and helping others – all to the health of the Body of Christ and to the glory of God!

When you find yourself discouraged, remember that even that great, Old Testament prophet Elijah had gotten discouraged. Allow others to come alongside you with exhortation; allow the Lord to encourage you.

Reesie's Recipes



Peanut Butter Chip Cookies

- 1 cup butter
- 1 1/2 cups white sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2/3 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- 3/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups peanut butter chips

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease cookie sheets. In a medium bowl, cream together the butter and sugar. Stir in the eggs and vanilla. Combine the flour, cocoa, baking soda and salt, stir into the creamed mixture. Finally, fold in the peanut butter chips. Drop cookies by heaping teaspoonfuls onto the prepared cookie sheets. Bake for 8 to 10 minutes in the preheated oven, until set. Cool on wire racks.

Supreme Strawberry Shortcake

- 1 (10 inch) angel food cake
- 2 (8 ounce) packages cream cheese, softened
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 (8 ounce) container cool whip, thawed
- 1 quart fresh strawberries, sliced
- 1 (18 ounce) strawberry glaze

Crumble the cake into a 9x13 inch dish. In a medium bowl, cream cream cheese and sugar until light and fluffy. Fold in whipped topping. Mash the cake down with your hands and spread the cream cheese mixture over the cake. In a bowl, combine strawberries and glaze until strawberries are evenly coated. Spread over cream cheese layer. Chill until serving.

Texas Style BBQ Beans

- 1 pound ground beef
- 4 (16 ounce) cans pork n beans
- 1 (4 ounce) can canned chopped green chile peppers
- 1 Small Vidalia onion, peeled and chopped
- 1 cup barbeque sauce
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 Tablespoon chili powder
- 1 Tablespoons hot sauce or to taste

In a skillet over medium heat, brown the ground beef until no longer pink; drain fat, and set aside. In a 3 1/2 quart or larger slow cooker, combine the ground beef, beans, green chiles, onion and barbeque sauce. Season with brown sugar, chili powder and hot pepper sauce. Cook on HIGH for 2 hours, or low for 4 to 5 hours.


Pray For Israel


Genesis 12

Verse for Today: Psalms 25:9 The meek will he guide in judgment: and the meek will he teach his way. Additional Passages for today: Zeph 2:3; Psalm 22:26; 147:6; 149:4; 1 Corinthians 4:21; Galatians 5:22-23; Philippians 2:5-7

Thought for Today: Jesus was the perfect example for us to follow. He was meek, humbly taking on the lowly form of man, seeking to do the work the Father had given Him. He recognized that true victory was in accomplishing the will of the Father, not in raising himself up to be all He could be.

Story for Today: Anav Praus was a 21-year-old young man thrilled to be graduating from college. He had applied himself to his studies and had learned many things. The celebrations left him a little unsettled. It seemed that many who offered congratulations were more concerned with academics, even though Anav was graduating from Bible School. A group of his friends stopped and invited Anav to join them in celebrating with games and food. While Anav enjoyed games and was very good at them, the mention of food had him ready to join the fun.

Tim, Tom, and Mark picked Anav up and headed for Tim's grandparents' house. Tim's grandma was known for being a wonderful cook, and the gang had ended up at her house many times to have a feast fit for a king. The guys were so excited to be closing out another chapter of their lives, while they looked forward to the next, where adventure awaited. This night, they got a little wild and crazy. Some of the guys had met up with their girlfriends while others just let loose and broke rules that they normally weren't tempted to do. Late into the night, or rather early in the morning, the flashing lights of the police car stopped one carload of his friends as they quickly sobered when they were taken into the station for disorderly conduct and reckless driving.

Anav was grateful he had decided to walk home instead of catching a ride with the unruly group. However, everyone knew that Anav possessed a great talent, skills, and ability to smooth over problems. The friends were quick to call the one guy they all knew would be able to get them out of this jam. Anav had been told by professors on several occasions that he could win any debate, as he aced papers and speeches, along with winning trophies at several competitions.

While Anav's friends thought he could get them out of trouble fairly easily, he felt that doing God's will was more important. Resolution rather than victory would be his goal. Being an example of what his friends should be seeking after, Anav began to write down a few words apologizing for his part in allowing things to get out of control. He also followed the leading of the Holy Spirit as he spoke of the guilt that accompanied their actions. Meekness was a character trait that Anav knew was part of the fruit of the Spirit. He had memorized Galatians 5:22-23: But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, Meekness, temperance: against such there is no law.

He now reached out to his friends and showed them many passages of scripture that spoke of the humility found in those that were saved. Moses and David were two of the men mentioned in the Bible who showed that reliance on God was the only way to express meekness fully. Although Moses was a great leader, he pointed the people he led to God, not taking credit for the good things that came their way. He didn't try to steal the glory. Anav prayed that God would show him what to do as he recognized that without God, they could do nothing.

Questions for Today: How about you? Do you take your troubles, and those of your friends, to the Lord recognizing that God's ways are higher than our ways and his thoughts are higher than our thoughts? Do you wait on the Lord and follow the directions the Holy Spirit gives, or do you run ahead and try to do everything you can before consulting with the Heavenly Father, thereby obstructing and interfering in the lessons God has for those around you? Do you show meekness as you deal with others, or do you show selfishness and pride?

Prayer for Today: Dear Heavenly Father, Thank You for the gift of the Holy Spirit and for sending Your son to die in our place. Thank you for allowing Jesus to be humble and meek. Thank You, Jesus, for being obedient even unto death on the cross. Please help us to follow your example and to complete the work that the Heavenly Father has given for us to do. Please help us to seek You and Your will in every situation, recognizing that without You we are nothing. Please help us to point others to You. In Jesus's Name, Amen.

God's Simple Plan of Salvation

My Friend: we are about to ask you the most important question of your life. Your joy or your sorrow for all eternity depends upon your answer. The question is: Are you saved? Do you know Jesus Christ as your personal LORD and Saviour? It is not a question of how good you are, nor if you are a church member, but have you put your faith in Jesus? Are you sure you will go to Heaven when you die?
