### Scars: The Unspoken Language

Our faithfulness in persecution will speak volumes for Christ to those who witness God's grace and love working through us and reaching out to our persecutors. Our words may fall on deaf ears but God's love shown through our actions and our scars of steadfastness will melt hearts as we point to our Saviour.

Henry Bosch relays this precious story of Adoniram Judson, the renowned missionary to Burma. This man of God endured untold hardships trying to reach the lost for Christ. For seven heart-breaking years he suffered hunger and privation. During this time, he was thrown in to Ava Prison and for seventeen months Adoniram was subjected to terrible mistreatment; yet he remained faithful to his Lord. As a result of this persecution, for the rest of his life he carried the ugly marks made by the chains and iron shackles that had so harshly bound him.

Undeterred, when Mr. Judson was released, he asked for permission to enter another province where he might continue preaching the gospel message of Jesus Christ. The godless ruler indignantly denied his request, saying, "My people are not fools enough to listen to anything a missionary might SAY, but I fear they might be impressed by your SCARS and turn to your religion.

When it's our turn to stand faithful for Christ, may we do so by His grace, no matter the cost. May we now begin to more frequently draw near to God, that He might fulfill His promise to draw near to us. Such drawing near must be a lifetime practice, not just a hard time shout for help. Afterall, love is the heart of the gospel.

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**A Word to the Wise: STUDY before you speak – Prov. 15:28-33**

“The heart of the righteous studieth to answer: but the mouth of the wicked poureth out evil things.”  
Proverbs 15:28

In the first verse of this chapter, the wise man tells us that our answers should be soft; that doesn't mean that they should be answers that compromise truth. Rather, they should be answers spoken with compassion and with love as our motivation of speaking into their lives. They aren't words of vengeance or anger, nor are they heated with a passion to “win” an argument. Rather, our desire is for God to win their hearts with truth, for His glory and for their sakes.

As we approach the end of this chapter, we see that our answers are to be more than mere feeling or what the popular notions are; they are to be well-researched. For that, we must both hear the whole of the situation (Prov. 18:13) and look into the whole counsel of God for the answer.

We see so many today that allow their feelings to direct their faith and their answers, regardless of what the Word of God says about it. The Bible gives solid answers about immigration, LGBT+ agendas, Marxism, evangelism, worship, faith, and the list goes on, but too many allow their feelings or the culture's feelings to dictate their answer instead of compassionately addressing the issues by the God-given facts found in scripture. Dear Reader, the Scriptures should be our final and only authority! This morning, my friend and brother, Billy Douglas sent a devotional out that he's given me permission to share. It describes perfectly what I am trying to say.

“In the days in which we live where deception does abound, it is more important than ever to know the Word of God! We must view everything through the lens of God's Word. It is the litmus test, the proving ground.

“[It's] the scales in which everything must be weighed, whether it be a dream, a vision, an experience, doctrine, teaching, etc. If it does not line up with scripture, it must be found wanting and rejected.”

Let me also point out that “the heart of the righteous” will not give skew that answer in order to benefit himself either. It's about loving God first and foremost, and then loving your neighbor as yourself. Our own interests ought not to weigh in on the matter. Simply, what does God say about a matter; that's what “our neighbor” needs to hear – let it be lovingly spoken with compassion – but let it be the pure Word of God that heals relationships, issues, and souls. The fear of God and the love of his neighbor combine to dictate this.

Whether dealing with people inside the church or with the unchurched, as we give answer or speak up in defense of truth in the face of deception, let us follow the words of Paul in 2 Timothy 4:2. “Preach the word; be instant in season, out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine.”

Our job is to present the truth with the love and compassion of Christ. He was full of grace and truth; let us be likewise. We needn't get in an argument; get out of the way and allow the Spirit to work. Ours is to speak the truth with grace and allow God to “bring the increase.” In other words, we are to be faithful and trust God for the outcome. Sometimes we are simply planting while another comes along to water and perhaps someone else gets the privilege of harvesting. Nonetheless, be faithful in what you've been called to.

Verses 31-33 tell us the outcome of those who will listen to the truth which is given by the heart of the righteous who studied and studies for the answer and the outcome of those who reject such godly truth and wisdom. It's vital, so I'll include those verses here. I don't want anyone to miss it:

“The ear that heareth the reproof of life abideth among the wise. He that refuseth instruction despiseth his own soul: but he that heareth reproof getteth understanding. The fear of the LORD is the instruction of wisdom; and before honour is humility.”



## An Attitude of Gratitude

“(To the chief Musician, A Psalm for the sons of Korah.) O clap your hands, all ye people; shout unto God with the voice of triumph.” Psalm 47:1

The Bible gives us many directions for good health and we would be wise to follow them. For example, Proverbs 17:22 tells us: “A merry heart doeth good like a medicine: but a broken spirit drieth the bones.” The word “merry” here means joyful, happy, full of good cheer.

God created us and knows what is best for us; He points us to the good things in life – HE IS GOOD! His Word constantly points us to the importance of gratitude, most often shown through thanksgiving, praise, and their natural outcome of joy.

Peter and James tell us to have joy in the midst of trials: “My brethren, count it all joy when ye fall into divers temptations.” (Jms 1:2). When fiery trials come “...rejoice, inasmuch as ye are partakers of Christi’s sufferings; that, when his glory shall be revealed, ye may be glad also with exceeding joy.” (1 Pet. 4:13) Responding with joy shows our trust (and gratitude) to God, His sovereignty, His goodness, and His power.

Paul commands that in everything give thanks, saying it is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you. (1 Thess. 5:18). Paul also urges that even our requests to God should be accompanied with thanksgiving. (Phil. 4:6). The above verses, and many others, commend us to have hearts of gratitude and praise. When your circumstances aren’t grand, God calls us to gratitude – HE IS ALWAYS WORTHY OF PRAISE!

The psalmist sets a high example before us in Psalm 7:17; “I will praise the Lord according to his righteousness: and will sing praise to the name of the Lord most high.” Not according to our feelings nor our circumstances, we are to praise God according to his righteousness! It’ll change your mind and your life.

Given enough time, science always catches up with the Bible. Professor Harleah Buck’s years-long scientific research finally confirms what believers already knew by God’s Word: Gratitude is good for us.

She states: “I expected the responses to be much more related to mood states, that you’re not as anxious, you’re not as depressed ...The fact that it actually changes your body physically was new information to me. Over those three studies, what we really established is that gratitude is good for your heart.” She went on to say that we pass our emotions (gratitude, etc.) on to one another – they’re contagious. What kind of emotions are YOU passing on to those around you?

Look at our key verse at the top of the page. What does clapping do? It gets our whole being involved and it draws attention to something – people want to know, “What’s going on?” Not only that, but it often draws others in, as well. My favorite pizza place claps and sings for someone’s birthday. I always feel like clapping and singing with them.

“The voice of triumph.” What will our voices be used for today? Praising God in triumph or murmuring or self-promotion? Let’s promote the one, true, God who has and is and will continue to triumph!

God has you where He wants you today. Walk in His triumphant victory regardless of what others my say or do. Regardless of how tough things get, go to God, clap and shout His praise, and use a voice of faithful triumph.



# Reesie's Recipes



## Chili Beef Soup

- 2 lb ground beef
- 1 stick salted butter
- 1 small onion, diced
- 1 red bell pepper, diced
- 1 green bell pepper, diced
- 2 (14 oz) can diced tomatoes
- 2 (14 oz) can chili beans
- 4 cups beef broth
- 1/2 cup ketchup
- 1/4 cup tomato paste
- 2 tbsp chili powder
- 2 tsp smoked paprika
- 1/2 tsp cumin
- 1/2 tsp black pepper
- 1 tbsp sugar
- 1/4 tsp cayenne pepper (optional)

Add ground beef to a large skillet and cook until browned, breaking it up into small pieces with a wooden spoon. Drain excess fat. Put ground beef in a large pot. In a large skillet add diced onion and bell peppers along with the butter. Saute until over medium heat until tender. Add to ground beef. Stir in diced tomatoes, beans, beef broth, ketchup and tomato paste. Mix well. Add chili powder, smoked paprika, cumin, sugar, and cayenne pepper (if using), and black pepper. Stir to combine. Bring the soup to a boil, then reduce the heat to low. Cover and let simmer for 25-30 minutes, stirring occasionally, to let the flavors meld.

## Southern Style Meatloaf

- 2 eggs
- 2/3 cup milk
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 Tablespoon A1 steak sauce
- 1 Tablespoon BBQ Sauce
- 3 slices bread, crumbled in processor
- 2 pounds ground beef
- 1 small onion, finely chopped
- 1/2 green bell pepper, finely chopped
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
- 1 cup brown sugar, divided
- 1 cup ketchup, divided

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Whisk eggs, milk, salt, ground black pepper, steak sauce and bbq sauce in a large bowl. Add crumbled bread and stir until dissolved. Mix ground beef, onion, green pepper and Cheddar cheese into bread mixture; transfer mixture to a pan. Combine 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/2 cup ketchup in a small bowl; spread over meat mixture.

Bake in the preheated oven until no longer pink in the center, 1 hour and 15 minutes. Drain grease off of meat loaf at the one hour mark. Combine 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/2 cup ketchup in a small bowl; spread over meatloaf and cook 15 minutes longer or until An instant-read thermometer inserted into the center should read at least 160 degrees

### **God Is Sufficient**

Not that we are sufficient of ourselves to think any thing as of ourselves;  
but our sufficiency is of God; 2 Corinthians 3:5

Not sufficient-all sufficient. These two expressions are the complement of each other. Together they are the key to an effective Christian life. The discovery and full conviction of our utter helplessness is the constant condition for spiritual supply. The aim of the Old Testament, therefore, is ever to show man's failure; that of the New, to reveal Christ's sufficiency. He has all things for us, but we cannot receive them until we admit that we have nothing. The very essence, therefore, of Christian perfection is the constant renunciation of our own perfection and the continual acceptance of Christ's righteousness. And as we receive deeper views of our nothingness and evil, it prompts us to claim more of His rich grace. But it is possible fully to realize our insufficiency and yet not take a firm hold of His "all things." This, too, must be done with a faith that will not accept less than all. The prophet was angry because the king of Israel struck the arrows upon the ground only three times. Had he done so five or six times, he could have had all (see 2 Kings 13:14-19). So let us meet God's full requirement. In humility let us receive His greatness and grace.



## THE STORY BEHIND THE SONG

### Be Thou My Vision

For some, it's the mysterious Celtic tune that draws their hearts and minds to this hymn. For others, the prayer of these lyrics convict or arrest their soul with a desire that this prayer would be their own. It is in its own right a prayer of consecration and a recognition of our great need for God to be all these things for His people.

Be Thou My Vision is an 8th century Irish hymn that was translated by Eleanor Hull in 1912. This hymn is rooted in medieval Irish Christianity; its lyrics came from a poem written in honor of "Saint" Patrick's heroic stand against Ireland's king in 433, in order to honor the King of kings, Jesus Christ. King Lóegaire hated Patrick and Christianity and sought to kill him. So, he issued a decree that prohibited anyone from lighting a flame or candle in the region— in observation of a pagan Druid festival. This decree intentionally fell on Resurrection Sunday.

Easter morning, Patrick risked his life by climbing to the tallest hill (Slane Hill), lit a huge Easter bonfire, and not only lit the hillside but began Ireland's conversion to Christianity. Legend has it, even the king eventually came to faith.

Perhaps verse three best describes Patrick's bold stand for Christ on that Easter morn: Be thou my breastplate, my sword for the fight; Be thou my dignity, thou my delight. Thou my soul's shelter, thou my high tow'r; Raise thou me Heav'nward, O Pow'r of my pow'r.



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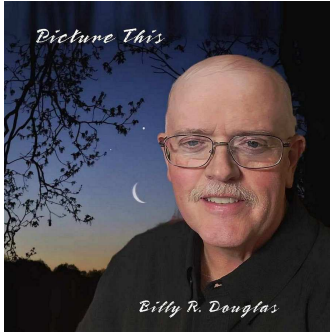
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### Nancy's Nuggets Of Wisdom
