Jesus Christ the same yesterday, and to day, and for ever. Hebrews 13:8



REESIE'S RECIPES

Potato Casserole

2 lb. package frozen hash browns1 can cream of chicken soup1/2 stick margarine, softened1 (16oz) sour cream

1/3 cup minced green onions

1 1/2 cups cheddar cheese

Top with browned and crumbled bacon (optional)

Mix together all ingredients and bake 45 minutes at 350.

Breakfast Casserole

1 (16 ounce) package Pork Sausage
10 eggs, lightly beaten
3 cups milk
2 teaspoons dry mustard
1 teaspoon salt
6 cups cubed bread
2 cups shredded sharp Cheddar cheese
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
1/2 cup sliced mushrooms (optional)

1 medium tomato, chopped (optional) 1/2 cup thin-sliced green onion (optional)

Preheat oven to 325 F. In large skillet, cook sausage over medium-high heat, stirring frequently until thoroughly cooked and no longer pink. In large mixing bowl, combine eggs, milk, mustard and salt; stir well. Distribute half the bread evenly in a buttered 9 x 13 x 2 inch baking dish. Sprinkle with half the pepper, half the cheese, half the sausage and half of each optional ingredient. Repeat layering using remaining bread, pepper, cheese, sausage and optional ingredients. Pour egg mixture evenly over casserole. Bake uncovered for 55-60 minutes, or until eggs are set. Tent with foil if top begins to brown too quickly.

Almond Joy Cake

1 box Chocolate cake mix
2 1/2 cups sugar
14 oz. coconut
12 oz. chocolate chips
1 large can pet milk
24 large marshmallows
1 stick margarine

3 oz. slivered almonds

Preheat oven to 350. Grease and flour two 9x13 pans. Mix cake according to box directions. Divide evenly into two pans. Bake about 20 minutes, let cool. In a large sauce pan bring 1 cup pet milk and 1 cup sugar to a rapid boil. Stirring constantly. Stir in marshmallows until dissolved. Add coconut and pour evenly over both cakes and cool. Bring to a boil 1/2 cup pet milk 1 1/2 cups sugar, stirring constantly. Add margarine and chocolate chips. Stir until melted. Add almonds. Pour over cake mixtures evenly and let cool.

Beef Stroganoff

1 lb. Ground beef
1 slice of onion, chopped
1 can beef broth
1/2 bad egg noodles
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can golden mushroom soup
1 (16oz) sour cream

Brown ground beef and onion together in skillet, drain. Cook noodles in beef broth until tender. Add soup to noodles and broth. Add ground beef to noodle mixture, add sour cream and mix together. Put in a 13x9 pan and cook in the oven on 350 until hot.

The Graces of Solitude and Silence

"He sitteth alone and keepeth silence, because he hath borne it upon him. He putteth his mouth in the dust; if so be there may be hope." Lamentations 3:28-29

We live in a day and age when many people feel lonely but they know nothing of solitude. There is much heartache so they fill their alone moments with social media, sitting in McDonald's drinking coffee or being on the phone, hoping to fill that void, hoping to put a band aid on their loneliness and pain. When men feel great anguish of heart they generally turn to self-pity or filling their sphere with people, hoping to forget their pain or loneliness for the moment. Some don't like to be alone because they don't like themselves; but like the old song goes, "No matter where you go, there you are." Some people like to just be busy or help others, but we all need to find time to be alone, really alone, with no one else but God. Not only do we know little of solitude but our society seems to know nothing of silence either. Oh the cacophony that fills our homes and ears. Where once we said, "Silence is golden," we now seem to be saying that "Silence is terrible." How can we possibly hear from God when we keep noise in our ears throughout the day and night? We have mp3 players, radios, i-touches, notebooks, Bluetooth devices, and the list goes on. Heaven help us if we are in the house alone; the problem is heaven "can't" help us because we refuse to hear from heaven, turning on radios, TVs, or listen to our favorite Billy Douglas CD to drown out the silence. We fill out lives with amusements; the word literally means "to not think." Folks, please don't get me wrong. I love listening to sermons, hearing my friend Billy or Evangelist Heltsley sing or preach; there's nothing wrong with good music, godly messages, or times of social interaction. The problem is this; we don't stop to just hear from God! There ought to be times when we just turn everything off, get "into our closets" with no one and nothing except God! Instead of filling our senses with chatter and song, let God fill your senses. Instead of hanging with friends and laughing, take some time to just "hang with God," listening for His voice. Let Him entertain your soul. Let Jesus lead you by the still waters, feeding you at His banqueting table, anointing your head with the oil of His Holy Spirit! "O taste and see that the Lord is good!" Allow His blessing to flow over you; bask in His presence, not looking for a blessing or you may miss it. Friends, JESUS IS THE BLESSING! Too often, we fill our time and our ears with so much that we don't leave room for the blessing of Jesus, the filling of God's Spirit. Don't be surprised if this comes hard; we are not used to it. Satan will bombard your mind, the phone will ring, and your mind will wander. Trust in the Lord and persevere. The hurt may grow stronger even as Jeremiah speaks to in our verse from Lamentations, press on into Christ and humble yourself to Him. Solitude and silence are so closely related to the meditation we spoke of last month. Take your Bible; don't rush through things; allow Jesus to be enough, as He feeds you, gives you refreshment, whispers to you, and fellowships with you. Allow God to drown out all people, thoughts, and sounds. Listen to Him; it's all about Him; it's not about you. Then with the solitude of the Saviour, the silence of His voice alone, submit to what it is He is leading you to do. He may give you a call to repentance; humble yourself to His will. Jesus may give you a call to further praise and worship; do just that! God continues to give grace to the humble; humility is shown through obedience. It starts with Who God is, what He has done, and because of those things we must act; we are to live faithful and holy lives because He is just that, faithful and holy. Solitude, silence, and meditation are gifts to you from God that you should unwrap each day. Oh how we need more of Him and less of us! Let me close with a quote from Charles Spurgeon: "There are times when solitude is better than society, and silence is wiser than speech. We should be better Christians if we were more alone, waiting upon God, and gathering through meditation on His Word spiritual strength for labour in his service. We ought to muse upon the things of God, because we thus get the real nutriment out of them. . . . Why is it that some Christians, although they hear many sermons, make but slow advances in the divine life? Because they neglect their closets, and do not thoughtfully meditate on God's Word. They love the wheat, but they do not grind it; they would have the corn, but they will not go forth into the fields to gather it; the fruit hangs upon the tree, but they will not pluck it; the water flows at their feet, but they will not stoop to drink it. From such folly deliver us, O Lord. . . . " Press on friends, be strong in the Lord; listen to Him.


O Faithless Generation

And one of the multitude answered and said, Master, I have brought unto thee my son, which hath a dumb spirit; 18 And wheresoever he taketh him, he teareth him: and he foameth, and gnasheth with his teeth, and pineth away: and I spake to thy disciples that they should cast him out; and they could not. 19 He answereth him, and saith, O faithless generation, how long shall I be with you? how long shall I suffer you? bring him unto me. 20 And they brought him unto him: and when he saw him, straightway the spirit tare him; and he fell on the ground, and wallowed foaming. 21 And he asked his father, How long is it ago since this came unto him? And he said, Of a child. 22 And oft-times it hath cast him into the fire, and into the waters, to destroy him: but if thou canst do any thing, have compassion on us, and help us. 23 Jesus said unto him, If thou canst believe, all things are possible to him that believeth. 24 And straightway the father of the child cried out, and said with tears, Lord, I believe; help thou mine unbelief.

Summary: Unbelief permeated the culture of Jesus' day, just as it dominates many sectors of our modern world. Jesus' ministry to a boy with seizures contains jewels of insight to help keep us from being influenced by our faithless culture. The bottom line is that we see an "O Faithless Generation." (1) "O FAITHLESS GENERATION" — we face that today, as they did then. Virtually all unbelievers — and, sadly, most Christians — turn immediately to doctors for healing needs, rather than to the Lord. Interestingly, Jesus included even His disciples in the rebuke as an "O faithless generation." Unbelief is contagious! The culture around us is faithless. Watch out, lest its pernicious influence spread to you. The rest of this account gives us some clues to overcoming the infectiousness of unbelief. (2) "BRING HIM UNTO ME" — Jesus Christ is Lord of all. Jesus is Lord over demons, as here Jesus is Lord over blindness, deafness, cancer, and every other disease. Jesus is Lord over fig trees...tall waves...bread and fish. In great need? "Bring the boy TO [JESUS]." (3) "BUT IF THOU CANST DO ANYTHING" — too low an appraisal of Jesus. Remember, Jesus walked on water, healed every disease and sickness, raised the dead, rose from the dead! There should never be an "if you can" on our lips. James 1:6 - But let him ask in faith, nothing wavering. For he that wavereth is like a wave of the sea driven with the wind and tossed. Doubt says, "Jesus, you either can't or won't do it."(4) "IF YOU CAN?" — Jesus' reaction was amazement. In Mark 8, the disciples mentioned forgetting to bring bread to eat. Jesus reminded them of His having fed the 4,000 with 7 loaves and the 5,000 with 5 loaves. Then He said, "Do you still not understand?" Jesus was saying to them [and us]: "No more of this 'if you can'!" (5) "ALL THINGS ARE POSSIBLE" —Enlarge the horizons of what you are looking to the Lord for. Don't limit God! Mark 10:27 - And Jesus looking upon them saith, With men it is impossible, but not with God: for with God all things are possible. Jeremiah 32:17 - Behold, I am the Lord, the God of all flesh: is there any thing too hard for me? Jesus has been able to save billions of people previously dead in sins. (6) "TO HIM THAT BELIEVETH" — Matthew 21:22 - And all things, whatsoever ye shall ask in prayer, believing, ye shall receive. Hebrews 11:6 - But without faith it is impossible to please him: for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him. If you believe in God, you will seek Him! Not man and man's wisdom. Not the ways of the world, which only reinforce unbelief. (7) "LORD, I BELIEVE" — Good! That's what the Lord wants to hear from our lips. (8) "HELP THOU MINE UNBELIEF" —This is honesty and sincerity before the Lord. Acknowledging our weakness and asking for help. And he looked for help in the right place — To JESUS he said, "Help thou mine unbelief!" In summary, a faithless culture teaches and spreads unbelief. You can come through victorious and full of faith, if you: 1. Remember Jesus' words: "Bring the boy TO ME." Jesus is "Lord of ALL." 2. Remove "IF you CAN" from your vocabulary in talking with the Lord. He CAN! And He said, "I AM WILLING!" 3. Believe Jesus' words that "EVERYTHING is possible for him who BELIEVES." Everything! 4. Respond to Him with: "I DO believe!" 5. And look to Him for help to remove any remaining doubts — "Lord, help me overcome my UNbelief!"

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No Mercy

"My brethren, count it all 'joy when ye fall into divers temptations; Knowing this, that the trying of your faith worketh patience." James 1:2,3 (KJV)

One of the main hindrances to the faith in our day and age are so much the temptations that the devil places on us individually, as the trials that we face because of family and friends and colleagues. So why are we supposed to count it all joy? Good question. No one sees much joy in some of the hardships we go through and here's the reason for that. We are stuck in the hardship and fail to find the Victory over it. We get bogged down by our emotion and sometimes - even our will to live. Some things that people have written in about this past week for prayer are mind boggling and I can see where they would just be in shock - yet PLEASE LISTEN TO THE LAST PART OF THAT VERSE! READ IT ALOUD WITH ME WILL YOU? James 1 verse 3... "Knowing this, that the trying of your faith worketh patience." I have had numerous people come right out and tell me that they never thought a man of God would go through some of the things I have. In fact, I've had a few that have gone so far to say that Preachers (and the like) were obscure from such trials. I think what they meant to say was that since we try to live an exemplary life as a Pastor that we wouldn't get ourselves into some of the things a "normal" person would. But, I'm here to tell you we are normal and many of us have children who are living in sin, and many of us wonder how we're going to pay this month's light bill; we're just normal people too. The difference is that God has called us to work "full-time" at helping others in their Christian walk through teaching and preaching; through fellowship and visitation; through helping to feed and clothe the poor . . . we do have a full life. That's another difference between us and many others who work in the secular world. We work all hours of the day and night. You've heard the phrase, "need has no season" and that's a true statement. So you see, when trials come our way, having been going all hours - we may tend to react just as anyone else does. But, if we're smart, we learn from the old-timers in our church. That's what I began doing many years ago. When things like the death of our son hit us some 24 years ago, we looked to people who had been through it. People who had weathered many storms not through the help of psychology, but through faith in God. Now, I have to stop and say that Osella and I have a very dear friend in the hills of Virginia who is one of the best counselors we have ever met. We didn't know that when we met her. All we knew of her was that she was a prayer warrior and "on fire" for the Lord. Later we found out that in her 60's she went back to school and got her degree in Psychology and she is amazing - and a wonderful Christian. Now in her 70's - and still going, she has a lot of practical experience to offer those who come to her. So, Christian Psychologists and Christian Counselors can be helpful if they lead us back to the faith. They can be helpful if they remind us that it is the cross that makes the difference and that we can begin "there" and build on that - working "patience" with future trials and putting faith to the test. One precious lady I knew from the Salvation Army (Brigadier Bongers) was herself a recent widow at the time, In fact she was proud of the fact that she was one of the only doughnut girls left alive at the time from WWII). I was going through a rough time in my ministry and one day she said to me, "Leftenant" God must really trust you a lot, and have something big for you to do for Him some day, because He has allowed you the privilege of this trial of your faith." I will never forget that! The thought that God trusted "me" meant something and somehow made it easier to see that bottom line... that amidst it all, He had it all worked out. It was my job to now trust Him and to just "stand". The Apostle Peter said it this way..."That the trial of your faith, being much more precious than of gold that perisheth, though it be tried with fire, might be found unto praise and honour and glory at the appearing of Jesus Christ: 1Pe 1:7 (KJV) Nothing brings glory and honor to the Lord like trusting Him and standing fast in our faith during the hardships of our lives. He will never fail ... we need not fail either!
