Lay Your Burden Down

Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light. Matthew 11:28-30

This is one of my favorite passages in the Bible. I so love and appreciate the reality of resting in Him.

In Biblical times, the economy of the world was largely agricultural, so the meaning of "yoke" was easy to comprehend. To plow a field, you would place a yoke on a cow, ox, or horse with a plow attached and drive the animal forward to break up the ground preparing a field for sowing.

Jesus offers us a yoke, but not a heavy one. In fact, since He often referred to us as sheep, one might wonder if we were meant to carry a burden at all, since sheep are never used as plow animals. When have you ever seen sheep carrying anything ... you don't — they weren't equipped to carry heavy burdens. In any case, the Lord promised us a light yoke, with rest for our souls. No doubt, it is the burden of sin that He intended to relieve us from, giving us true rest.

Taking up Jesus yoke is equivalent to laying down a heavy burden, since His yoke offers rest, and He offers to carry our burden of sin. We often hear songs about laying our burdens down. Those words are a deep ministry to heavy-laden souls. If you are burdened today, take His yoke upon you ... lay it at His feet ... be relieved ... enter His rest.

A Word to the Wise - Saintly Sentinels - Prov. 4:20-27

"Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it are the issues of life." Proverbs 4:23

Pointing to wisdom and proclaiming her blessings upon this life and the life to come, exhorting his son to walk in her way while also desperately warning him of the wicked's destructive ways; Solomon urges us to listen and obey his words, keeping them before our eyes as a fresh reminder and locking them away in the deep recesses of our heart – the seat of our affection. He compels us to do so NOT because they are simply his words; such urgent promptings are because this is the way of life and health – wholeness and holiness without which no man shall see the Lord! Wisdom's way – holiness – is to be cherished in one's heart before it, in reality, guards and guides our way, bringing the outward fruits of true holiness.

Once Wisdom and its love, joy, health, and holiness has found its home in one's heart, the wise man commands his son to put a guard over it. We could call them sentinels of saving faith and grace which must be placed at the gates of one's heart, lest little foxes would come in and spoil the pure waters that now flow from it. As Ralph Wardlaw warns, "Even the renewed heart requires the exercise of an unceasingly jealous vigilance." He continues: "So, if we would keep the moral affections in healthy action, we must feed on 'the bread of life,' and breathe the air of heaven. We must avoid error, and live upon truth. It is thus that the affections are to be kept vigorous and pure. It is thus that the spiritual life is to be maintained in its active vitality – its efficient and influential energy. But the language implies the exercise of an unremitting jealousy over every propensity to sin, and especially the 'sin that may most easily beset us."

If the headwaters of our heart become polluted, the streams which flow from us will also be polluted. So we set holy sentinels at the heart's gates to guard our impulses, motives, emotions, and disposition. We pray that "the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom..." (Col. 3:16). Let's see where these gates stand.

Vs. 24 posts Saintly Sentinels to guard the mouth and ear gates. Jesus warns that what's in our heart spills out our mouth while James well-describes the tongue's work as either destructive or full of praise. Wardlaw describes a "forward mouth" as one "not subject to control; a mouth that gives utterance, with proud self-will and scorn of restraint, to the dictates of a rebellious spirit – an unsubdued, unsanctified mind." Today, many feel that words are just words, but they are a window of the heart. As for ears: whether friends, song, or television, we must also refuse to listen to ungodly speech. Another's forward mouth may little by little corrupt our heart, mind, or mouth.

Vs. 25 positions a Saintly Sentinel at the eye gate, not only for guarding against evil allurements, but to also guide our eyes to heaven, its God, and our Redeemer. Hebrews well-exhorts us to look away from all else, keeping our eyes focused on Jesus, following Him every step of the chosen and holy way.

Vs. 26 places a Saintly Sentinel to guard our feet and our path. Solomon's father, the great King of Israel, David, pondered the path of his feet. He considered well where his feet were according to the Word of God. If he were off but a little, he made haste to return to the way of righteousness (Ps. 119:59, 60).

These Saintly Sentinels stand guard along the pathway, establishing it as the way to go. Should we begin to turn to the right or the left – compelled by the lust of the eyes or the lust of a pharisaical spirit – may the Holy Spirit convict us, pricking our hearts and keeping us on the path of holy living. Dear Reader, let NOTHING draw you or drive you off the path!

May we take to heart both a negative and a positive example as expressed by Scripture: Avoid the epitaph of King Rehoboam: "And he did evil, because he prepared not his heart to seek the LORD" 2 Chronicles 12:14. And heed the admonition of Jesus in John 13:17: "If ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them."



Thanksgiving in Times of Trouble

On Christmas morning, before opening gifts, my wife and children gather around to actively listen as I read the "Christmas Story" from Luke chapter two. I assume that many of our readers have a similar tradition. This month, we will "gather together to ask the Lord's blessing" and read the "Thanksgiving chapter," I Chronicles chapter sixteen. Inside is found a wonderful "Thanksgiving" meal, bountiful praises to the most high God, a reminder that "he cometh to judge the earth," and the real reason for all this praise and thanksgiving: "O give thanks unto the Lord; for he is good; for his mercy endureth for ever." (v. 34)

It's vital that we learn this truth and hide it deep within our heart and mind; it must be our constant reminder of who God is. No matter the circumstance, regardless the hurt, turmoil, or trouble, our God IS good; his mercy endures FOREVER! This is reason enough to give Him thanks; He is worthy of all glory, honor, and praise.

With the unimaginable horrors of Hamas' attacks upon Israel and her innocent civilians, we continue to believe that He who keeps Israel neither slumbers nor sleeps; God is still sovereign and allows such trial and hurt for His purpose. Even as I write these words, my heart is burdened for Israel and over the very real prospect of such tribulation coming to America and what that would mean for myself and my own friends and family. Even so, I am reminded and comforted by the words of Methodist preacher John Wesley and puritan divine John Flavel, as they point to the goodness and mercy of God as His sovereign hand of providence intercedes in the lives of men and countries. I imagine that much of what we suffer can be attributed to God's enduring mercy.

John Wesley, in writing to a young person regarding the various trials she was going through, encouraged her with these words: "We know indeed that these as well as all things are ordered by unerring wisdom, and are given us exactly at the right time, and in due number, weight, and measure. And they continue no longer than is best, for chance has no share in the government of the world. The Lord reigns and disposes all things, strongly and sweetly, for the good of them that love him." Do we trust our God enough to give thanksgiving and praise in the midst of our storm?

John Flavel reminds us that: "Sometimes God uses the hand of enemies. He has bowed the hearts of many wicked men to show great kindness to his people that were intended for evil and mischief. Joseph's brothers designed his ruin, but God used it for his advancement. The design and scope of providence must not escape our thorough consideration. Above all others, this is the most warming and melting consideration—'And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose' (Rom. 8:28). ...Consider also the relation providence bears to our prayers! This is sweet meditation. Prayer honours providence and providence honours prayer!" O that our prayers would show our trust in the Creator of heaven and earth; let our heart echo that of the centurion, with tears, "Lord, I believe; help thou mine unbelief!" Dear Reader, His mercy endureth forever!

Times of trouble will come: international/national upheaval; disease and death; emotional, financial, mental strains; relational issues; sin, and a host of things too numerous to list. None of it matters in regard to our response to it. In the midst of the pain, sadness, or even devastation, trust in God's goodness and mercy. Remember God's will for you as described by Paul in I Thesalonians 5:18. "In every thing give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you." When anxiety creeps in, remember to "Be careful for nothing; but in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God." (Phil. 4:6)

Come what may, "O give thanks unto the Lord; for he is good; for his mercy endureth for ever."



Reesie's Pea Salad

1/2 cup sour cream
1/4 cup mayonnaise
1 Tbsp sugar
2 tsp apple cider vinegar
1/4 tsp salt
1/8 tsp pepper
4 cups frozen peas, thawed
3/4 cup shredded cheese
8 slices bacon, cooked crisp and crumbled
1/3 cup onion, diced

Thoroughly combine dressing inhredients. Add peas, cheese, bacon and onion. Toss gently.

Hawaiian Banana Bread

1/2 cup butter softened
1 cup sugar
2 large eggs
1 very ripe banana mashed
8 ounces crushed pineapple (do not drain)
2 cups flour
1 tsp baking powder
1/2 tsp baking soda
1/4 tsp salt

Preheat oven to 350 In a large bowl cream butter and sugar together with a mixer until light and fluffy Add eggs one at a time and beat to incorporate Stir in mashed banana and pineapple In a separate, medium sized bowl, sift together flour, baking powder baking soda, and salt. Add to wet ingredients Stir in coconut flakes shreds Pour mixture into a greased loaf pan (9 x 5) Bake for 60 minutes or until a toothpick inserted

comes out clean.

1/4 cup shredded coconut

Reesie's Pineapple Upside Down Cake

1 box butter golden cake mix
3 eggs
1 stick margarine, melted
1 can sliced pineapples in juice
1 lb box light brown sugar
1 additional stick margarine, melted
1 jar Maraschino cherries

Preheat oven to 350. Spray a 9x13 cake pan with cooking spray. Spread brown sugar evenly across the bottom of pan and pour one stick melted margarine evenly over the brown sugar. Lay the pineapples down on top of brown sugar, reserve juice for cake mix. Place a cherry in the center of each pineapple. In a large mixing bowl add three eggs, one melted stick of margarine and reserved pineapple juice adding enough water to the juice to make one cup of liquid. Add to cake mix and mix on medium speed for two and a half minutes. Pour the cake batter over the brown sugar and pineapples. Bake for 45 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Remove from oven, cool for 5 minutes. And flip out onto cake taker



The Place Of Judgment

Because of this coming judgment, the Preacher concludes that this is why there is a time for every purpose and every work - because everything a man does will affect the judgment of God.

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
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
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
