George Washington's Wisdom Still Speaks Truth Today

Last Thursday night (8/13/20), the statue-topplers tore down another statue of the father of our country, just after they defaced it. This statue of George Washington stood in Grand Park near Los Angeles City Hall since 1933. This is yet another example of the ongoing war on America as founded. A couple of months ago, Michael Ramirez, one of the great political cartoonists of our time, had a brilliant piece showing a statue of George Washington with a description of his accomplishments: 1.Father of our country 2.First president of the United States 3.Defeated one of the most powerful nations in the world. On the other side of the drawing was a caricature of a woke social justice warrior. His name was "Imah Luzer." And his achievements were listed as well: 1.Scored 300 on XBOX 2. Won participation trophy 3. Created safe space 4. Lives with parents. The Imah Luzer character holds a rope, lassoed around the bronze likeness of Washington, which he is about to yank down. Today it seems that many of those who have accomplished nothing positive are trying to tear down reminders of those who have accomplished great things, including heroes of the past. It is strange to see a genuine hero being made into a villain in our own lifetime. And so it is with George Washington. The reason, of course, is slavery. George Washington grew up as a gentleman farmer in colonial Virginia and was a fourth generation slave-owner. But by the end of his life, he had decided slavery was immoral and so, at his death, he freed his slaves and made provision for them. But there is no atonement to the Left. There is no forgiveness of sins. Because George Washington owned slaves. he is unforgivable to these woke social justice warriors. Nonetheless, there are many warnings that George Washington made that I think modern Americans could learn from, including these mobs of woke social justice warriors. First of all, there is the matter of gratitude to God. The "woke" mob seems to operate from a sense of entitlement. The world owes them everything. Washington operated from a Christian perspective, where he asked for God's help at virtually every turn and where he thanked the Lord for His help. Washington marveled at how many times God helped the American cause. In 1778, he wrote to one of his military leaders, "The hand of Providence has been so conspicuous in all this, that he must be worse than an infidel that lacks faith, and more than wicked, that has not gratitude enough to acknowledge his obligations." That is, obligations of gratitude. Today, instead of gratitude, we see a whole generation of ingrates. No wonder they disrespect the flag and kneel in protest against the National Anthem. To them, being an American is more of a curse than a blessing. But George Washington experienced repeatedly what he believed was the hand of Providence in helping his ragtag army of ill-fed farmers and merchants as they faced what was perhaps the strongest army and navy on earth at that time. He said in his First Inaugural Address that our first obligation was to thank the Lord that we even became a nation. "No People can be bound to acknowledge and adore the invisible hand, which conducts the Affairs of men more than the People of the United States. Every step, by which they have advanced to the character of an independent nation, seems to have been distinguished by some token of providential agency." Without God's help, we would not have been able to create this government. And what is this government? Washington puts it this way: It is a government instituted by "the People of the United States" themselves. If we don't like things as is, we are free to change them. In his Farewell Address, Washington warns that we should do everything to protect "religion and morality," which he calls twin pillars of human happiness. He also warns against letting political factions rule the day. But I think probably the greatest single admonition from our first president comes from his Circular to the States, written in June 1783. Washington ended this letter to the governors of the 13 states with a prayer that we would all learn to imitate "the Divine Author of our Religion," meaning Jesus. And he says that without imitating Jesus we can never hope to be a happy nation. I don't think I've ever seen America in a more miserable state than it is at present, with all the riots in the streets and strangers hurting (in some cases, killing) strangers. Are we imitating Jesus? Far from it. Are we a happy nation? Far from it. We would do well to learn from George Washington, rather than to desecrate his memory. www.jerrynewcombe.com

Every time a child is abused, a child is raped or someone is persecuted because of the color of their skin, it further reinforces the reality of an existing devil. "Let the high praises of God be in their mouth, and a two-edged sword in their hand;" Psalms 149:6

There are many interesting couplets throughout the Bible. Jesus calls us to watch and pray. Yes we are called to pray to the God of heaven; but we are also called to activity on our part. We appeal to God's sovereignty but realize that man has a responsibility as well. One missionary, when he first entered Swaziland, learned the importance of watching AND praying. He learned to pray with his eyes open; otherwise he would be hit with stones or mud or spears thrown at him. We see another kind of couplet in Nehemiah 4:17; "They which builded on the wall, and they that bare burdens, with those that laded, every one with one of his hands wrought in the work, and with the other hand held a weapon." The Christian is a soldier-called to work AND to fight; called to be vigilant, watching AND praying; called to worship AND to guard, fight, and move forward, or in some instances to wait. The Bible is well rounded, calling men to rely upon God and also to fulfill his responsibility to the Creator. Perhaps one of the best examples of this is found in James; where we are commanded to live by faith, resting AND working in Him. For, faith without works is dead. Works do not produce our faith; but rather, are an evidence of it! There are numerous passages that hold these couplets which call us to rest in God's sovereignty but also to work and fight in His power. Psalm 149:6 reminds us to rest in God's awesome holiness, giving high praise to Him; and yet, be armed for battle, fighting for our Sovereign. We are called to be singing swordsmen—to worship AND fight! Those of us who love the Biblical and Constitutional founding of this great country and appreciate the gifts, given to us by our founding fathers, of limited government, the guaranteed protection of our God-given rights, and liberty for all, can't help but feel a welling up of righteous indignation as various groups attack and erode our nation's foundations, deconstructing the old guard (Constitution), the old paths (Bible), and the culture of virtue and sanctity of life that made America great. Without the intervening Hand of Providence upon this land, things are sure to get worse. The Christian should neither be surprised by that, nor should it surprise him that God expects us to have peace in the midst of the storm or even in our "righteous indignation," as we share the Gospel, Truth, and love of Christ. "Peace?" you ask. Yes, peace. In John chapter sixteen Jesus talked to the disciples about the fact that they would face trials, about the Father's love for them, and that they would be scattered and away from their Master. Then the loving Savior spoke these words in verse 33. "These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world." John would later write in 1 John 5:4, "For whatsoever is born of God overcometh the world: and this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith." Dear Reader, we overcome the world and rest in Him by faith. Faith in what? Faith in religion? Faith in self? Faith that the government will be fixed and made right? God forbid. Herein lies the answer; it is through faith in JESUS ALONE! In Christ we have peace and good cheer, even in the midst of tribulation, because we find rest IN HIM. Some ways to tell if we are just indignant or if we have "righteous indignation" are whether we are doing something about the trouble that surrounds us or if we are just complaining about it. Can we speak Truth into this chaos and maintain our peace or is our joy stolen by the circumstances? Can we be at rest after "having done all to stand," trusting that God is sovereign and that "all things work together for good to them that love God"? Are we being "Singing Swordsmen," fighting the fight of faith and resting in Him with God's "high praise" in our mouths? In America we are afforded the right to vote; this is one simple way in which we can do something. So we must vote as if our very freedom and liberties depend on it. We must vote as if our posterity, this country, and the world depend on it. Our vote must be cast as though our churches, cities, and economy depend on it. Our ballots must be marked as if our freedom to worship and to witness depends on it. We must vote as if our national sanity, security, history, and witness as a "Christian nation" depend on it. We must vote as if raising our children by Biblical standards depends on it. And we must vote as if our life depends on it; because it does! And yet... After we have responsibly cast our vote we must leave that booth and walk out into a world of chaos and turmoil, peacefully content and at rest, having faith in the sovereignty and goodness of God, His will, and His plan.

Fruit Cocktail Cake

2 eggs

1 1/2 cups sugar

2 tsp. baking soda

1/2 tsp. salt

14 to 19 oz. can fruit cocktail with juice

2 cups flour

Icing

3/4 cup water

1/2 cup milk

1/2 cup butter

1 tsp. vanilla

Beat eggs slightly. Add all ingredients except flour. Mix together. Add flour and bake at 350 in greased 9x13 pan for 45 minutes. Boil icing ingredients except vanilla. Add flavoring and pour over hot cake in pan. Serve warm

Beef and Noodle Casserole

1 lb extra lean ground beef

1 medium onion, chopped

1 medium green pepper, chopped

17 oz. can whole kernel corn, drained

4 oz. can mushroom stems and pieces, drained

1 tsp salt

1/4 tsp black pepper

11 oz jar of salsa

3 cups dry medium egg noodles, cooked

28 oz can diced tomatoes, undrained

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Brown ground beef and onion in nonstick skillet over medium heat. Transfer to slow cooker. Top with remaining ingredients in order listed. Cover and cook on low for 4 hours.

Hawaiian Meatballs

1 1/2 lb. ground beef

2/3 cup cracker crumbs

1 medium onion, chopped

1 egg

1 1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. ginger

1/2 tsp. hamburger seasoning

1/4 cup milk

3 Tbsp. ketchup

1/2 tsp. pepper

1 Tbsp vegetable oil

Sauce

2 Tbsp corn starch

1/2 cup brown sugar

13 1/2 oz. can pineapple tidbits, drained

1 Tbsp soy sauce

Syrup from pineapple tidbits

1/3 cup vinegar

Meatballs: Mix all ingredients except vegetable oil, shape into little balls. Brown in the vegetable oil. Remove meatballs and keep warm while making the sauce. Sauce: Mix cornstarch and sugar. Stir in reserved pineapple syrup, vinegar and soy sauce until smooth. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture thickens and boils. Boil and stir one minute. Add meatballs and pineapple and heat thoroughly.

Celebration Chicken

2 1/2 to 3 lb cut up chicken

1 envelope onion soup mix

1/2 cup ketchup

1/4 cup brown sugar

1/4 cup water

Place chicken in single layer on foil in shallow baking pan. Combine other ingredients, pour over chicken. Seal edges to make completely enclosed package or use a covered casserole dish.. Bake at 375 for 50 minutes.

Watch...And Pray, Because You Love!

Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, and watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication for all saints; Ephesians 6:18

Worthy News recently covered a story about the impact of prayer in the lives of the everyday American. As I read through the poll, I was shocked at how little Americans pray. In these days, prayer simply must become an essential in our daily walk. Pondering this, I realized I've never done an in-depth series on prayer, its importance, and how to be an effective prayer warrior. This verse in Ephesians 6 is part of Paul's most articulate exposition on spiritual warfare, the passage in which he describes the enemies arrayed against us, and the spiritual armor we must wear for the battle. Once our armor is on, prayer takes center stage in his battle strategy. And notice Paul's usage: ALL times, with ALL prayer, with ALL PERSEVERANCE, for ALL saints. Could he have been more urgent or comprehensive in his counsel toward equipping us? Prayer seems to be the single most critical element in spiritual warfare. Yet it appears that prayer is one of the most neglected disciplines in the body of Christ. Visit the next prayer meeting at your congregation, if there is one, and calculate the percentage of those present. We don't have the time...or, we don't make the time...or the meeting is at the wrong time...or, it's actually kind of boring ... What's really going on here? To begin with, we're not aware, we're not watching. Often in scripture, prayer is immediately connected to watchfulness; [Mat. 26:41; Mar. 13:33; Mar. 14:38; Luk. 21:36]. Paul also stressed this. "Keep alert", he says. If prayer is neglected, one primary cause is our failure to WATCH, to be alert. We are numb, preoccupied, lazy, overwhelmed, distracted, or drunk on whatever; anything but watchful like Gideon's 300 men. But prayer is a natural sequel to watchfulness. When we're aware of what's really happening, we almost naturally feel the urgency to respond to it. But, if we are going to get serious about prayer, it will be because we are mobilized to watch, and by watching, to care, and by caring to respond. Prayer is motivated by deep concern. Check this in your own life. When were your prayers most fervent and persevering? What were you so deeply concerned about? Prayer is really about love, isn't it. Pray because you watch; watch because you care; prayer is an act of love.

The Two Margarets: No Tide Could Turn Their Hearts

On May 11, 1685, Margaret Wilson and Margaret MacLauchlan were drowned in the Solway Firth (a Scottish coastal water) for refusing to swear an oath declaring King James II of England as head of the church, for Jesus Christ alone is the church's head. Eighteen year-old Margaret Wilson was to be drowned with an older woman, Margaret McLaughlin. The soldiers tied them both to wooden stakes in the water. The younger Margaret

was tied nearer to the shore so she would see the older woman die first and be persuaded to give up her beliefs (recant) and save her life. As the older woman was drowning, the soldiers asked the younger Margaret what she thought of her companion now. Margaret Wilson replied "I see Christ wrestling there. Think ye that we are the sufferers? No, it is Christ in us; for He sends none a warfare on their own charges." Then, just when she herself was about to drown, the soldiers lifted up her head and asked her to pray for the king. She answered "God save him if he will, for it is his salvation I desire". However when they asked her take the oath, she said "I will not, I am one of Christ's children, let me go". The soldiers then pushed her head down under the water again until she died. Just before she died, Margaret had sung from Psalm 25. Some will think that it was only a little thing for which they died; but to them it was part and parcel of the faith which they held dear. The two Margarets are just two of the many people who paid the ultimate price because of their love for the Lord Jesus Christ. Reader, do you hold Christ and His office so dear?

The Real Firebrand

John Wesley's father, Samuel, was a dedicated pastor, but there were those in his parish who did not like him. On February 9, 1709, a fire broke out in the rectory at Epworth, possibly set by one of the rector's enemies. Young John, not yet six years old, was stranded on an upper floor of the building. Two neighbors rescued the lad just seconds before the roof crashed in. One neighbor stood on the other's shoulders and pulled young John through the window. Samuel Wesley said, "Come, neighbors, let us kneel down. Let us give thanks to God. He has given me all my eight children. Let the house go. I am rich enough." John Wesley often referred to himself as a "brand plucked out of the fire" (Zechariah 3:2; Amos 4:11). In later years he often noted February 9 in his journal and gave thanks to God for His mercy. Samuel Wesley labored for 40 years at Epworth and saw very little fruit; but consider what his family accomplished!


